Providing art materials that allow ALL children to create self-portraits and representations of their families is so important. One FIRE member recently told the story of how their child was not coloring in the faces on their pictures because they did not have access to art materials in the classroom in shades that matched their skin tone. Once these material were provided, the child began doing so.






